THE YEAR READING TAKES OFF

First grade is a **big leap** from kindergarten: reading moves from letters and sounds to actually *reading*, writing emerges, and the academic pace picks up. It's also the key window for spotting reading struggles early. This roadmap walks the year in **ten steps**.

General guidance. Children develop at their own pace, and expectations vary by school and state. This roadmap describes typical patterns; for concerns about your child, talk with their teacher, school, or pediatrician.

What First Grade Is About

WHAT TO KNOW

First grade is the year of the **reading leap** — and a real step up in academic expectations and independence. Children move from “learning letters” to “reading words and sentences,” while building writing and math.

HOW TO HELP

Support the leap with **daily reading practice and patience** — first grade is demanding, and steady encouragement matters more than speed.

GOOD TO KNOW

Children click into reading at **different times** across first grade — a range is normal, but keep a close eye on progress.

Reading Takes Off

WHAT TO KNOW

This is the headline: children learn to **decode words, build reading fluency, and read simple books independently**, growing their sight-word bank and starting to read for meaning.

BY THE NUMBERS

Decoding

HOW TO HELP

Read **together every day** — take turns, let them sound out words, reread favorites for fluency, and keep it positive and pressure-free.

GOOD TO KNOW

Rereading familiar books builds **fluency and confidence** — it's not "too easy," it's exactly right.

Writing Emerges

WHAT TO KNOW

Writing grows from single words to **sentences and short pieces**. Expect phonetic (“invented”) spelling, growing punctuation, and journals or simple stories — big progress from kindergarten.

BY THE NUMBERS

HOW TO HELP

Encourage writing without over-correcting spelling — value the **ideas and effort**, and let phonetic spelling be a sign of growing sound knowledge.

WATCH OUT

Correcting every misspelling can **kill the joy** — at this age, getting ideas down matters most; polish comes later.

Math Grows

WHAT TO KNOW

First-grade math builds on counting: **adding and subtracting within 20, understanding place value (tens and ones), telling time, working with money**, and comparing numbers — still very hands-on.

BY THE NUMBERS

Add/subtract

within 20

Place value

tens & ones

Time & money

real-world math

HOW TO HELP

Practice math in **daily life** — counting money, telling time, adding snacks — and use objects to make addition and subtraction concrete.

GOOD TO KNOW

Understanding *why* (with objects) beats memorizing facts — number sense now prevents struggles later.

Social-Emotional Growth

WHAT TO KNOW

Socially, first graders build **deeper friendships, more independence, and the ability to follow multi-step directions** and work in groups — while still needing lots of support with big feelings.

BY THE NUMBERS

Friendships

deeper & more important

Independence

doing more alone

Multi-step

following directions

HOW TO HELP

Support growing independence and friendships, and keep **coaching emotional regulation** — first graders are capable but still little.

GOOD TO KNOW

Friendship ups and downs are **normal and important** — they're how kids learn social skills.

Homework & Habits

WHAT TO KNOW

Light homework usually begins — often **daily reading plus a short activity**. The habits that matter: reading every day, a consistent routine, and a calm, brief homework time.

BY THE NUMBERS

Light homework

reading + a little

Read daily

non-negotiable

Short & calm

10–20 min

HOW TO HELP

Set a **consistent, brief homework routine** centered on daily reading — keep it short and positive, and prioritize sleep over extra drilling.

GOOD TO KNOW

If homework regularly takes far longer than expected or causes distress, **tell the teacher** — it's useful information.



Understand Assessment

WHAT TO KNOW

First grade uses **reading benchmarks and screenings** (like DIBELS-style checks) to track decoding and fluency, plus informal math and writing assessment. These flag who needs early support.

BY THE NUMBERS

Reading benchmarks

track decoding/fluency

catch needs early

Low-stakes

no big exams

HOW TO HELP

Pay close attention to **reading benchmark results** — if your child is behind on decoding or fluency, ask about intervention *now*, not next year.

GOOD TO KNOW

First grade is the **prime window** to catch and address a reading difference — early help is dramatically more effective.

Know Your Role This Year

WHAT TO KNOW

Your role: **read together daily, watch reading progress closely, keep routines steady, and stay in touch with the teacher.** Your daily reading time is the single biggest lever this year.

BY THE NUMBERS

Read daily

the top priority

Watch progress

especially reading

Communicate

partner with the teacher

HOW TO HELP

Make **daily reading together** your anchor, track how reading is coming along, and partner closely with the teacher — first grade rewards involvement.

GOOD TO KNOW

Twenty minutes of reading together a day is **the highest-value thing** you can do for a first grader.

Watch For

WHAT TO KNOW

First grade is **the** year to notice reading struggles. Flag persistent trouble **connecting letters to sounds, blending words, remembering sight words, or a strong dislike of reading** — plus attention or social concerns.

BY THE NUMBERS

HOW TO HELP

If your child is **consistently struggling to decode or avoiding reading**, ask the school about a reading evaluation — first grade is the ideal time to act.

WATCH OUT

Early reading struggles are the top window for spotting **dyslexia** — acting in first grade changes the whole trajectory.

Summer & Second Grade Ahead

WHAT TO KNOW

Summer keeps reading momentum. In second grade, reading **fluency** deepens and children begin “reading to learn.” Ending first grade reading simple books and adding confidently is right on track.

BY THE NUMBERS

Keep reading

daily, all summer

Grade 2

fluency deepens

Strong base

decoding + adding

HOW TO HELP

Read daily over the summer to **lock in the reading leap**, and head into second grade celebrating how far your child has come.

GOOD TO KNOW

Don't let summer erase the reading gains — daily reading (even just for fun) protects a whole year of progress.

First Grade at a Glance

A friendly snapshot of typical first-grade milestones — a guide, not a test. Children vary, and progress across the year.

Reading

Decodes (sounds out) words, reads simple books with growing fluency, builds a sight-word bank, and reads for basic meaning.

Writing

Writes sentences and short pieces, uses phonetic spelling, and begins basic punctuation and capitalization.

Math

Adds and subtracts within 20, understands place value (tens and ones), tells time, works with money, and compares numbers.

Social-emotional

Builds friendships, works more independently, follows multi-step directions, and (with support) manages feelings.

Watch for

Persistent trouble decoding or blending words, forgetting sight words, avoiding reading, or attention struggles — the key year to ask about a reading evaluation.
