A bachelor's degree is one great path — but it isn't the only one, or the right one for everyone. Millions of **well-paying, in-demand careers** are reached through certificates, apprenticeships, and two-year degrees, often with far less time and debt. Good Careers Don't All Need a Degree

WHAT TO KNOW

It's a myth that every good job requires a bachelor's. A large share of well-paying, stable careers need a **certificate, license, apprenticeship, associate degree, or solid training** — not four years of college.

HOW TO HELP

Open your options: judge careers by **fit, demand, and pay** — not by whether they require a four-year degree.

GOOD TO KNOW

A shorter path can mean **earning sooner and owing less** — a real financial head start, not a fallback.

Know Your Non-Degree Routes

WHAT TO KNOW

Several proven routes lead to good careers: **industry certificates, licenses, apprenticeships (earn while you learn), two-year associate degrees, the military, coding bootcamps, and on-the-job training.**

HOW TO HELP

Match the **route to the field**: trades favor apprenticeships, many health roles use certificates or associate degrees, and tech often values certs and skills.

GOOD TO KNOW

Some routes let you **stack credentials** over time — start with a certificate, add more, even a degree later.

Explore the Skilled Trades

WHAT TO KNOW

The **skilled trades** — electrician, plumber, HVAC technician, welder, carpenter, machinist — are in high demand, pay well, resist automation, and are learned largely through paid apprenticeships.

HOW TO HELP

If you like **hands-on, problem-solving work**, explore the trades through local apprenticeships, unions, and trade programs — demand is strong nationwide.

GOOD TO KNOW

Skilled trades face a **wave of retirements** — meaning strong demand and opportunity for people entering now.

Explore Healthcare Roles

WHAT TO KNOW

Healthcare offers many strong careers **without a bachelor's**: dental hygienist, radiologic technologist, respiratory therapist, LPN, paramedic, surgical tech, and more — via certificates or associate degrees.

HOW TO HELP

If you want to work in **healthcare**, research the many roles reachable through community-college and certificate programs — with clear ladders to advance later.

GOOD TO KNOW

Many healthcare roles let you **start working, then upskill** — e.g., LPN, then RN, then beyond, often with employer support.

Explore Technology Paths

WHAT TO KNOW

Tech increasingly values **skills over degrees**. IT support, cybersecurity, networking, and some development roles are reachable through **industry certifications, bootcamps, and associate degrees** plus a strong portfolio.

BY THE NUMBERS

HOW TO HELP

For tech, stack **respected certifications and hands-on projects** — many employers hire on demonstrated skill, not just a diploma.

GOOD TO KNOW

A strong **portfolio of real projects** can outweigh a degree in many tech roles — build things and show them.

Explore Public Safety & Service

WHAT TO KNOW

Careers in **public safety and service** — police, firefighting, EMS, and many government and civil-service roles — typically require training academies, certifications, or an associate degree rather than a bachelor's.

HOW TO HELP

If you're drawn to **serving your community**, look into public-safety academies and civil-service pathways — many offer strong benefits and stability.

GOOD TO KNOW

Public-service roles often come with **pensions and benefits** that add real long-term value beyond the salary.

Consider Business & Independent Paths

WHAT TO KNOW

Many **business, sales, and entrepreneurial** careers reward skill and drive over credentials: real estate, sales, hospitality management, and starting your own business — where results speak loudest.

HOW TO HELP

If you're self-driven, explore **licensed or skill-based business paths** — many need a license or certificate, not a four-year degree.

GOOD TO KNOW

Some of the highest earners in sales and real estate **never finished a bachelor's** — performance drives pay.

Weigh Cost vs. Return

WHAT TO KNOW

A big advantage of non-degree paths is **economics**: lower cost, less (or no) debt, and earning sooner. Apprenticeships even *pay* you to learn. Run the numbers alongside interest and demand.

HOW TO HELP

Compare the **full cost and time to earning** of each path — a shorter, cheaper route to a well-paying career is a powerful financial win.

WATCH OUT

Graduating debt-free (or getting paid to train) is a **massive head start** — weigh it seriously against a costly degree.

Know How to Get Started

WHAT TO KNOW

Getting started is concrete: explore programs at **community colleges, trade schools, and registered apprenticeships**, check prerequisites, and talk to people working in the field.

HOW TO HELP

Research **local community-college programs, trade schools, and apprenticeship.gov**, note the entry requirements, and reach out to people in the career.

GOOD TO KNOW

Community colleges are **affordable and flexible** — an ideal, low-risk place to start almost any non-degree path.

Keep Your Doors Open

WHAT TO KNOW

Choosing a non-degree path **doesn't close the college door**. Credentials often stack, associate degrees transfer, and many people add a bachelor's later — frequently with employer help — once they're earning.

BY THE NUMBERS

HOW TO HELP

Treat your first credential as a **foundation you can build on** — a degree later is always possible, and often cheaper once you're working.

GOOD TO KNOW

Many employers **pay for further education** for current staff — you can earn, work, and upskill without early debt.

Well-Paying Paths Without a Bachelor's

Fields with strong, in-demand careers reachable without a four-year degree. (Check current pay and outlook at BLS — numbers vary by region and change.)

Skilled trades

Electrician, plumber, HVAC technician, welder, carpenter, machinist — learned via paid apprenticeships; high demand.

Healthcare

Dental hygienist, radiologic technologist, respiratory therapist, LPN, paramedic, surgical tech — via certificates or associate degrees.

Technology

IT support, cybersecurity, networking, and some dev roles — via industry certifications, bootcamps, and portfolios.

Public safety & service

Police, firefighter, EMT/paramedic, and many civil-service roles — via academies, certifications, and associate degrees.

Business & independent

Real estate, sales, hospitality management, and entrepreneurship — via licenses, certificates, and results.
