ADMISSIONS, DEMYSTIFIED

College admissions rewards families who understand the game — the plans, the deadlines, the essay, the list. This playbook walks the whole journey in ten steps, each with the key numbers and the common mistakes to avoid. Pair it with our **Paying for College Playbook** for the money side.

Build a Balanced College List

WHAT IT IS

The foundation of a good outcome is a smart **list** — a mix of **reach**, **match**, and **safety** schools chosen for genuine fit, not just prestige.

BY THE NUMBERS

8–12

a healthy number of applications

**Reach / Match /
Safety**

aim for a balance of all three

Fit first

academics, size, cost, culture

YOUR MOVE

Sort every school into reach, match, or safety by comparing your GPA and scores to its admitted range — and make sure every safety is one you'd happily attend.

WATCH OUT

A list of all reaches is the most common mistake — at least a third should be match or safety schools you're likely to get into.

Understand Application Plans

WHAT IT IS

When you apply matters as much as *where*. Each plan has different deadlines, rules, and trade-offs — and one of them is binding.

BY THE NUMBERS

ED

binding — you must attend if admitted

EA

non-binding early answer

Regular

the standard January track

YOUR MOVE

Use **Early Action** freely for an early answer; use **Early Decision** only for a clear first choice you can afford, since it commits you.

WATCH OUT

ED is a **binding contract** — you generally can't compare aid offers, so never apply ED to a school you can't afford without seeing the package.

Master the Testing Landscape

WHAT IT IS

The SAT/ACT picture has changed. Most colleges are now **test-optional**, but strong scores can still help — so the decision is strategic, not automatic.

BY THE NUMBERS

~1,900+

test-optional or test-blind colleges

Superscore

many mix your best sections

Submit if it helps

above a school's median

YOUR MOVE

Submit scores only when they're at or above a school's admitted median; if they're below, lean on test-optional and let your GPA and essays carry the application.

WATCH OUT

"Test-optional" is not "test-blind" — at test-optional schools, a strong score still helps, so don't skip testing without a plan.

Write Essays That Stand Out

WHAT IT IS

The essay is where a student becomes a person. The **personal statement** (one, shared across schools) and **supplements** (per school) carry your voice.

BY THE NUMBERS

650 words

the Common App personal statement
max

Show, don't tell

specific stories beat summaries

Every supplement

tailor "why us" to each school

YOUR MOVE

Start early, write about something only you could write, and revise ruthlessly — a specific, honest story beats an impressive-sounding one every time.

WATCH OUT

Never let anyone else write it — admissions readers know a student's voice, and a too-polished, adult-sounding essay is a red flag.

Line Up Recommendations Early

WHAT IT IS

Letters of recommendation add a voice colleges trust — teachers and counselors who can speak to who you really are in and out of class.

BY THE NUMBERS

1 counselor

+ usually 1-2 teachers

Ask by spring

of junior year, ideally

Give them material

a brag sheet / resume

YOUR MOVE

Ask teachers who know you well (not just those who gave you an A) early, and give each one a resume and a note on what you hope they'll highlight.

WATCH OUT

Asking a week before the deadline burns goodwill and yields a rushed letter — great recommenders write for many students, so get in line early.

Build a Focused Activities List

WHAT IT IS

Colleges look for **depth over breadth** — sustained commitment and impact in a few areas beat a long list of shallow memberships.

BY THE NUMBERS

10 slots

on the Common App activities list

Depth > breadth

leadership and impact

Show growth

years, roles, results

YOUR MOVE

Highlight the few activities where you went deep — took on leadership, created something, or made a real impact — and describe results, not just titles.

WATCH OUT

A padded list of one-meeting clubs reads as filler — two or three genuine commitments say far more than ten token ones.



Nail the Application Itself

WHAT IT IS

Most students apply through the **Common App** (or Coalition), which sends one core application to many schools — but the details and deadlines are where points are lost.

BY THE NUMBERS

1,000+

colleges accept the Common App

Nov 1 / Jan 1

typical early / regular deadlines

Fee waivers

available if you qualify

YOUR MOVE

Complete the core Common App once, then tackle each school's supplements and deadlines on a tracked calendar — and request fee waivers if cost is a barrier.

WATCH OUT

Deadlines are in the college's time zone and fill fast — submit a day early, and never trust a single late-night deadline for multiple schools.

Prepare for Interviews

WHAT IT IS

Some colleges offer **interviews** — often optional, often with alumni. They rarely make or break an application, but they can add a human dimension.

BY THE NUMBERS

Optional

at most schools that offer it

Alumni or staff

usually informal, conversational

Two-way

your chance to ask questions

YOUR MOVE

Treat it as a conversation, not an interrogation — know why you're interested, have thoughtful questions ready, and follow up with a brief thank-you.

WATCH OUT

Declining an *offered* interview can signal low interest at schools that track it — say yes when you reasonably can.

Decode Your Decisions

WHAT IT IS

Decisions arrive as more than yes or no. Understanding **accept, deny, waitlist, and defer** tells you what to do next — and none of them is the end of the story.

BY THE NUMBERS

Waitlisted

qualified, but no room yet

Deferred

early app moved to regular

Accept by ~May 1

National Decision Day

YOUR MOVE

If **waitlisted** at a top choice, send a letter of continued interest and any new achievements; if **deferred**, treat it as a fresh chance to update your file.

WATCH OUT

A waitlist is not a maybe you should wait on — always secure and deposit at a school that accepted you before any waitlist plays out.

Make Your Final Choice

WHAT IT IS

With offers in hand, the last step is choosing — weighing fit, cost, and opportunity, then committing with a deposit by the deadline.

BY THE NUMBERS

Revisit

admitted-student days & overnights

Compare net price

not sticker (see our aid guide)

~May 1

deposit to claim your spot

YOUR MOVE

Revisit your top choices as an admitted student, compare true **net price** across offers, and deposit at the one that fits best — then celebrate.

WATCH OUT

Depositing at more than one school (“double depositing”) violates the rules and can cost you both offers — choose one.

The Admissions Timeline

Freshman–Soph.	Explore interests, build habits, keep grades up — the transcript starts here.
Junior fall	Take the PSAT; start rigor (AP/honors); begin thinking about the list.
Junior spring	SAT/ACT; ask for recommendations; visit campuses; draft the list.
Summer before senior	Write the personal statement; refine the list; start applications.
Senior fall	Finalize list; submit Early (Nov 1) apps; request transcripts & letters.
Senior winter	Regular deadlines (~Jan 1); file the FAFSA; submit supplements.
Senior spring	Decisions arrive; compare offers; revisit; deposit by ~May 1.

The golden rule: start earlier than feels necessary. The families who feel calm in senior year are the ones who began the list, testing, and essays the spring and summer before.
