Traditional Public Schools

The default — and still the choice of most

WHAT IT IS

Free, government-funded neighborhood schools open to every child in the attendance zone. About **9 in 10** U.S. students attend one.

KEY FACTS

Free

no tuition, funded by taxes

Zoned

assigned by your address

~90%

of U.S. students attend

BEST FOR

Families wanting a local, no-cost option with the full range of sports, activities, and services, including robust special education.

GOOD TO KNOW

Quality and funding vary by district and even by school — but **open enrollment** in many states now lets you request a public school outside your zone.

Public Charter Schools

Public and free, but run independently

WHAT IT IS

Publicly funded but independently operated schools that trade some regulation for flexibility, under a performance “charter” they must renew.

KEY FACTS

Free

publicly funded, no tuition

Lottery

admission when oversubscribed

Themed

often a specific focus

BEST FOR

Families wanting a **free public** option with a distinct focus — STEM, classical, arts, or college-prep — or a different approach than their zoned school.

GOOD TO KNOW

Admission is often by **lottery**; quality varies widely by operator; and not all offer transportation or the full special-education services of a district.

Magnet Schools

Public schools built around a theme

WHAT IT IS

Public schools with a specialized theme — STEM, performing arts, IB, world languages — designed to draw motivated students across district lines.

KEY FACTS

Free

public, no tuition

Application

often testing or audition

Specialized

deep theme focus

BEST FOR

Students with a **strong interest or talent** in the magnet's theme who want to go deep with like-minded peers.

GOOD TO KNOW

Admission can be **competitive** and may require testing, a portfolio, or an audition; transportation and available seats vary by program.

Private Independent Schools

Tuition-funded, fully self-governed

WHAT IT IS

Schools funded by tuition rather than government, with full control over their curriculum, admissions, and philosophy — and often small classes and rich resources.

KEY FACTS

Tuition

varies widely by school

Selective

application + often testing

Aid

need-based aid common

BEST FOR

Families seeking small classes, a specific philosophy, or resources **who can pay or secure aid** — and students who fit the school's culture.

GOOD TO KNOW

Cost is the real barrier — but **most independent schools offer need-based aid**, so never rule one out before asking the financial-aid office.

Religious & Faith-Based Schools

Academics woven with faith

WHAT IT IS

Private schools — Catholic, Christian, Jewish, Islamic, and more — that integrate a faith tradition and its values with academics.

KEY FACTS

Tuition

often lower than independent

Faith-based

values woven throughout

Aid

frequently available

BEST FOR

Families who want their **faith and values** reflected in their child's daily education and community.

GOOD TO KNOW

Religious instruction and observance are part of the program, and policies reflect the tradition — a great fit for some families, and worth understanding fully for all.

Montessori Schools

Child-led, hands-on, mixed-age

WHAT IT IS

A method (public *or* private) built on **self-directed learning**, hands-on materials, and mixed-age classrooms, following Maria Montessori's approach.

KEY FACTS

Public or private

both models exist

Mixed-age

3-year classroom spans

Self-directed

child sets the pace

BEST FOR

Independent, curious learners who thrive with autonomy, concrete materials, and freedom to follow their interests.

GOOD TO KNOW

The name "Montessori" isn't protected — quality varies enormously, so look for **AMI or AMS accreditation** and observe a classroom before enrolling.

Waldorf Schools

Arts, imagination, and unhurried academics

WHAT IT IS

An arts-integrated, developmentally-paced approach emphasizing creativity, nature, storytelling, and a later, gentler start to formal academics.

KEY FACTS

Mostly private

some public charters exist

Arts-rich

creativity across subjects

Low-tech

screens introduced late

BEST FOR

Families who value **creativity, play, and nature**, and a childhood-first pace over early academic pressure.

GOOD TO KNOW

The **later start on reading** and limited early technology suit many children beautifully but can complicate transfers — plan transitions thoughtfully.

Online & Virtual Schools

Full-time school, anywhere

WHAT IT IS

Complete schooling delivered remotely — public or private — with flexible pacing and location, from accredited virtual academies to online private schools.

KEY FACTS

Free or tuition

public options are free

Remote

learn from anywhere

Flexible

self-paced scheduling

BEST FOR

Students needing **flexibility** — elite athletes, health needs, travel, advanced pacing — or a calmer environment than a large campus.

GOOD TO KNOW

Success demands **strong self-motivation** and an engaged support adult; the trade-off is less in-person social life and fewer hands-on extracurriculars.

Homeschooling

Parent-directed, fully customized

WHAT IT IS

Education directed by the family at home, with complete control over curriculum, pace, schedule, and values — legal in all 50 states.

KEY FACTS

Legal in all 50

rules vary by state

Family-funded

curriculum costs vary

Customized

total flexibility

BEST FOR

Families wanting **maximum customization and involvement**, with the time and commitment to lead learning day to day.

GOOD TO KNOW

State rules (notification, testing, records) vary widely, and **socialization and structure need intentional planning** — co-ops, sports, and classes fill the gap.

Microschools & Learning Pods

The one-room schoolhouse, reinvented

WHAT IT IS

Very small, often mixed-age schools or family co-ops — a modern one-room-schoolhouse model that grew rapidly after 2020.

KEY FACTS

5–15 students

intentionally tiny

Tuition or co-op

cost-shared models

Newer

a fast-growing option

BEST FOR

Families wanting a **small, personalized, community-driven** setting with close relationships and flexibility.

GOOD TO KNOW

This is a **newer, less-regulated** model — accreditation, teacher credentials, and permanence vary, so vet the specific program carefully.

Funding & Choice Programs

Private and specialized schools can be more affordable than they look. A growing set of state programs helps families pay 0 here are the four you'll hear about most.

Open Enrollment

Lets you send your child to a public school outside your zoned area or district — the most common, lowest-barrier form of choice.

Vouchers

Provide public funds you can apply toward **private-school tuition**. Availability, amounts, and eligibility vary widely by state.

Education Savings Accounts (ESAs)

Deposit public funds into a **flexible account** you spend on approved costs — private tuition, tutoring, curriculum, therapies — the fastest-growing choice program.

Tax-Credit Scholarships

Fund private-school scholarships through donations that donors claim as tax credits — a common workaround where direct vouchers aren't available.

Check your state. These programs vary enormously — some states have all four, some have none. Search your state's department of education for 'school choice' to see what's available to you.

How to Choose

There's no "best" school — only the best *fit* for *your* child. Weigh these five, in this order.

1

Start with your child

Their learning style, needs, strengths, and struggles come before any school's reputation.

2

Academics & support

Curriculum rigor, class size, special-education and gifted services, and how they support your child specifically.

3

Cost & logistics

True cost after aid, transportation, hours, and daily commute — the practical details that make it sustainable.

4

Culture & values

The community, discipline approach, and values — does your child belong here?

5

Visit and ask

Tour, sit in on a class, talk to current families, and ask hard questions before you commit.

The one rule: the right school is the one where *your* child will be known, challenged, and happy — not the one with the best name.
