IMMERSION THROUGH A HOST FAMILY AND LOCAL HIGH SCHOOL

A **student exchange** in South Korea offers deep **cultural and language immersion** — living with a **host family** and attending a Korean high school or a university. This guide is for **exchange students and host families**: it covers **high-school and university exchange, the host-family model, programs, and visas**, and points you to the K12 Academics directory to find and compare exchange organizations.

Understand Why Families Choose South Korea for Exchange

WHAT TO KNOW

An exchange in South Korea offers **deep Korean-language and cultural immersion, a supportive host-family experience, a rigorous school system, and lifelong friendships** — a transformative step for a young person, and a rewarding one for host families on either side.

HOW TO HELP

Weigh an exchange—s **immersion and growth** against time away from home — for language, independence, and a second family abroad, it—s transformative.

WATCH OUT

An exchange means **living everyday life** with a host family in South Korea — far deeper immersion than a tourist trip or short program.

Understand the Types of Exchange

WHAT TO KNOW

Two main forms: **high-school exchange** (ages ~15–18 — a semester or year with a host family, attending a Korean high school) and **university exchange** (a semester or year through your home university—s partnership). There are also **short-term and summer exchanges**, and, for families, **hosting an incoming student from South Korea**. Browse and compare options in the **K12 Academics directory**.

HOW TO HELP

Match the **exchange to your situation** — high-school exchange with a host family, university exchange through a partnership, a summer program, or hosting an incoming student — then find options in the K12 Academics directory.

GOOD TO KNOW

Find and compare **specific exchange organizations and school partnerships** in the K12 Academics directory — this guide stays program-neutral.

Understand the Host-Family Model

WHAT TO KNOW

At the heart of exchange is the **host family**: you live as a **member of the household**, share meals and routines, and immerse in the language and culture. Good programs **carefully screen and match** families and students, set clear **expectations**, and provide a **local coordinator**. Families who **host** an incoming student gain the same cultural exchange in reverse — it's a two-way relationship.

HOW TO HELP

Understand the model — you live as a **member of a host family** (screened and matched by the program), with a local coordinator; hosting a student offers the same in reverse.

GOOD TO KNOW

Reputable programs **screen and match host families and students carefully** — and provide a local coordinator for support.

Choose a Reputable Program & Organization

WHAT TO KNOW

The **organization matters more than the destination**. Choose a **reputable, vetted exchange organization** (in the US, look for **CSIET-listed** programs; elsewhere, established, accredited bodies). A good program provides **screening, host-family placement, a local coordinator, orientation, 24/7 support, and clear policies**. Compare what each includes before committing.

HOW TO HELP

Choose carefully — a **reputable, vetted organization** (CSIET-listed in the US) that provides screening, placement, a coordinator, orientation, and 24/7 support.

GOOD TO KNOW

The **organization matters more than the destination** — vetting and support are what keep an exchange safe and successful.

Check Eligibility & Requirements

WHAT TO KNOW

High-school exchange generally requires an age of about **15–18**, **good academic standing**, and **some basic Korean** (often not mandatory, but helpful), plus health and character references. **University exchange** requires being **enrolled at a home university with a South Korea partnership** and meeting its academic and language criteria. Programs guide you through eligibility.

HOW TO HELP

Check eligibility — high-school exchange (about 15–18, good standing, some basic Korean); university exchange (enrolled with a partnership, meeting academic and language criteria).

GOOD TO KNOW

Basic language **helps but often isn—t mandatory** for high-school exchange — immersion builds fluency fast.

Understand the Visa & Legal Framework

WHAT TO KNOW

Exchange students usually need an **appropriate student or exchange visa** for longer stays, which your **program helps arrange**. For longer stays, exchange students need the appropriate student visa (the program or school helps arrange it). Requirements typically include **program acceptance, host-family details, funds, and insurance**. Minors have **additional consent and guardianship** paperwork. Confirm current rules with the relevant consulate.

HOW TO HELP

Know the framework — longer stays need a student/exchange visa (your program helps arrange it), with extra consent and guardianship paperwork for minors.

GOOD TO KNOW

A good program **guides the visa process** — and handles the extra consent and guardianship paperwork for minors.



Plan Safety, Support & Wellbeing

WHAT TO KNOW

Support is what makes exchange work: expect a **local coordinator, orientation, 24/7 emergency contact, and clear conduct and safety policies**. Confirm **insurance** and how the program handles **host-family issues or homesickness**. For host families, expect **vetting, training, and ongoing support**. Never choose a program that skimps on support.

HOW TO HELP

Prioritise support — a local coordinator, orientation, 24/7 emergency contact, insurance, and clear policies; never choose a program that skimps on support.

GOOD TO KNOW

Support structure is everything — a local coordinator and 24/7 contact turn problems into manageable bumps.

Prepare for Cultural Adjustment

WHAT TO KNOW

Expect **culture shock and homesickness** — they—re normal and pass. School life, family routines, meals, and social norms differ; approach them with **openness and flexibility**. Lean on your **host family and coordinator**, keep in reasonable (not constant) touch with home, and say yes to new experiences. The hard early weeks give way to real belonging.

HOW TO HELP

Prepare for the adjustment — culture shock and homesickness are normal and pass; stay open, lean on your host family and coordinator, and limit constant contact with home.

GOOD TO KNOW

Keeping **reasonable, not constant, contact with home** helps you settle — it lets the exchange become your world.

Plan the Timeline & Apply

WHAT TO KNOW

Apply **well ahead** — often **6–12 months before** departure. The usual order: **choose a reputable program, apply and be accepted**, complete **host-family matching and orientation**, then arrange the **visa and travel**. Exchanges align with **the Korean school year (starting in March)** or university semesters. Early applications get the best placements.

HOW TO HELP

Plan the sequence — choose a program, apply and be accepted, complete matching and orientation, then arrange visa and travel; apply 6–12 months ahead.

GOOD TO KNOW

Apply **early** — the best host-family placements and program spots go first, 6–12 months ahead.

WHAT TO KNOW

Once you know your route, **find and compare specific exchange organizations and school partnerships in the K12 Academics directory**. Choose a reputable, vetted program, complete matching and orientation, arrange your visa, and go in with openness. Confirm current rules with the program, your school, and the relevant consulate.

Student Exchange in South Korea: The Essentials

A snapshot — program-neutral. Confirm details with a reputable organization, your school, and the consulate.

Who it—s for

Exchange students and host families — high-school students (about 15–18) with a host family attending a Korean high school, and university students on a semester or year through a partnership.

The host-family model

You live as a member of a host family (screened and matched by the program), sharing everyday life for deep immersion, with a local coordinator; hosting an incoming student offers the same in reverse.

Programs

Choose a reputable, vetted exchange organization (in the US, look for CSIET-listed programs); a good program provides screening, placement, a coordinator, orientation, and 24/7 support — the organization matters more than the destination.

Eligibility & visa

High-school exchange needs about ages 15–18, good standing, and some basic Korean (helpful, often not mandatory); university exchange needs enrollment plus a partnership; longer stays need a student/exchange visa, with extra paperwork for minors.

Support & timeline

Expect a local coordinator, orientation, 24/7 emergency contact, and insurance; culture shock is normal and passes; apply 6–12 months ahead, aligning with the school year or semesters.
