This guide is for students planning a **semester or year abroad**: it covers **program types, credit transfer, costs, and the student visa**, and points you to the K12 Academics directory to find and compare programs.

Weigh Denmark—s **English-taught quality and quality of life** against a high cost of living (and fees for non-EU/EEA students) — for innovative, English-taught study in a superb setting, it—s a strong choice.

Denmark offers **many English-taught programs** and a famously good quality of life — tuition-free for EU/EEA students.

Understand the Types of Study Abroad Programs

WHAT TO KNOW

Your main options: **direct enrollment** (you enroll at a local university — the most immersive), **exchange** (through your home university—s partnership — you pay home tuition), **third-party provider programs** (which bundle courses, housing, and support — the most guided), and **faculty-led short programs** (a few weeks with your own professors). Browse and compare options in the **K12 Academics directory**.

HOW TO HELP

Match the **program to your goals** — direct enrollment for immersion, exchange for value, a provider for support, or a faculty-led program for a short taste — then find options in the K12 Academics directory.

GOOD TO KNOW

Find and compare **specific programs, providers, and host universities** in the K12 Academics directory — this guide stays program-neutral.

Understand Credit Transfer & Academics

WHAT TO KNOW

Credits use the **ECTS system** (30 ECTS ≈ a full semester). Before you go, **get your courses pre-approved by your home study-abroad and academic advisors** so credits transfer cleanly toward your degree. You'll receive a **transcript** to bring home — keep syllabi and coursework in case of later evaluation.

HOW TO HELP

Protect your credits — get courses **pre-approved by your home office**, understand ECTS and local grading, and keep syllabi for transfer.

GOOD TO KNOW

Pre-approve your courses with your home study-abroad and academic advisors before departure — it's the key to clean credit transfer.

Know the Costs & Funding

WHAT TO KNOW

Costs vary by route: **exchange** students usually pay **home tuition**; **provider programs** charge a program fee (bundling tuition, housing, and support); **direct enrollment** means free tuition for EU/EEA students (fees for others), though Denmark's living costs are high. Denmark's cost of living is **high**. Look into **scholarships** (the Gilman (US students), Erasmus+ (Europeans), and provider aid), and check whether your **financial aid travels** with you.

HOW TO HELP

Budget by route — exchange (home tuition), provider (one bundled fee), or direct enrollment; Denmark costs are high. Pursue scholarships and check aid portability.

GOOD TO KNOW

Check whether your **home financial aid can be applied** to study abroad — many students fund part of the cost this way.

Understand the Student Visa & Entry

WHAT TO KNOW

EU/EEA students don't need a visa. Non-EU/EEA students need a **student residence permit** (with proof of funds and insurance). Tuition is **free for EU/EEA students but charged for others**. You'll typically show **proof of acceptance, sufficient funds, housing, and health insurance**. Shorter programs often need only standard Schengen entry. Start early — the process takes time. Confirm current rules with the relevant consulate.

HOW TO HELP

Know your entry — EU/EEA students need no visa; non-EU/EEA students need a **student residence permit**; shorter programs often use standard Schengen entry; start early.

GOOD TO KNOW

Tuition is **free for EU/EEA students but charged for others** — non-EU/EEA students should budget for fees and check scholarships.

Plan Health, Safety & Insurance

WHAT TO KNOW

Arrange **health insurance** that covers you in Denmark (some programs include it). Denmark is **very safe**. Know your **program—s support and emergency contacts**, register with your **home country—s embassy** if advised, and keep copies of key documents.

HOW TO HELP

Cover the essentials — health insurance (some programs include it), sensible precautions, and your program—s support and emergency contacts.

GOOD TO KNOW

Know your **program—s in-country support and emergency contacts** before you go — a good provider makes this easy.

Prepare Language & Culture

WHAT TO KNOW

The main language is **Danish**, and **a large share of programs are taught in English**. Learning some Danish helps daily life, though English is very widely spoken. Housing options include **university residences, homestays (great for language), and shared apartments**. Embrace the cultural differences — they—re the point.

HOW TO HELP

Prepare to immerse — many programs are in English (some Danish helps; English is widespread), choose housing that fits your goals (a homestay boosts language), and embrace the culture.

GOOD TO KNOW

A **homestay** is a fast route to immersion — a homestay is the fastest route to language immersion.

Plan the Timeline & Apply

WHAT TO KNOW

Apply **well ahead** — typically **a semester or two before** you go. The usual order: **meet your home study-abroad office**, choose and apply to a **program**, secure **course pre-approval**, then arrange your **visa, housing, and insurance**. Denmark offers **fall, spring, summer, and full-year** options. Deadlines and visa processing drive the schedule.

HOW TO HELP

Plan the sequence — start with your home study-abroad office, apply to a program, pre-approve courses, then handle visa, housing, and insurance; apply a semester or two ahead.

GOOD TO KNOW

Start with your **home study-abroad office** — they guide approvals, credit, aid, and often have partner programs ready.

Make the Most of It

WHAT TO KNOW

Once in Denmark, **engage fully**: embrace hygge, cycle Copenhagen, travel Scandinavia, and pick up some Danish. Keep an eye on **credit and attendance requirements**, document your experience, and use your program—s support. A semester abroad is as much about growth as academics.

WHAT TO KNOW

Once you know your route, **find and compare specific study-abroad programs, providers, and host universities in the K12 Academics directory**. Work with your home study-abroad office, pre-approve credits, apply, and arrange your visa. Confirm current rules with the Danish immigration service (SIRI) and the host university and the relevant consulate.

The destination

A welcoming Nordic study-abroad destination — many English-taught programs, strong design and sustainability, and the famous hygge lifestyle — with bases in Copenhagen, Aarhus, Odense, and Aalborg.

Program types

Direct enrollment (most immersive), exchange (pay home tuition), provider programs (bundled courses and support), and faculty-led short programs — find and compare in the directory.

Credit & academics

Credits use ECTS (30 ECTS ≈ a full semester); get courses pre-approved by your home study-abroad and academic advisors so they transfer cleanly; you receive a transcript — keep syllabi.

Costs & funding

Exchange (home tuition), provider (one bundled fee), or direct enrollment; costs are high; pursue scholarships (Gilman, Erasmus+, scholarships) and check whether home aid travels with you.

Visa & move

EU/EEA students need no visa; non-EU/EEA students need a student residence permit; tuition is free for EU/EEA but charged for others; shorter programs use Schengen entry; budget for high living costs.
