WHAT TO KNOW

Route types include: **private and international schools** (the best pay, for licensed teachers), **language centres, universities**, and lots of **volunteer and NGO programmes** (which often offer board rather than a salary). Check the Requirements

WHAT TO KNOW

A **TEFL** is **expected for paid work**; **volunteer and NGO roles** are more flexible (some accept newly qualified teachers). **International schools** require a **degree, licence, and experience**. Native English is favoured, but fluent non-native speakers can find work. Adaptability suits a developing, culturally distinct market.

Line up your credentials — a **TEFL** for paid roles (volunteer roles are flexible); international schools require a degree, licence, and experience.

GOOD TO KNOW

Volunteer and NGO roles are the **most accessible** — some accept newly qualified teachers with a passion for the work.

Understand the Visa & Work Authorization

WHAT TO KNOW

Paid teaching requires an **employer-sponsored work permit**, arranged by your school or programme with your documents; **volunteer programmes** typically arrange the appropriate permits. Secure a role first, and confirm current rules with Ethiopia's immigration authorities.

Know your route — paid teaching needs an **employer-sponsored work permit**, and volunteer programmes arrange the appropriate permits; secure a role first.

Reputable schools and **organized volunteer programmes** arrange the appropriate permits — a help for newcomers.

Know the Pay & Benefits

WHAT TO KNOW

Salaries are **modest**, and many roles are **volunteer** (offering board rather than a salary); **international schools pay the most**. Ethiopia's **very low cost of living** means paid work covers expenses, though substantial saving is unlikely — the reward is cultural immersion.

Set expectations — modest pay (many roles volunteer, offering board); international schools pay most, and the very low cost of living covers expenses.

Understand Contracts & What to Watch For

WHAT TO KNOW

Clarify whether a role is **paid or volunteer (board only)**, and check **hours, pay, and permit support**. International schools offer the fullest packages. Keep sensible **situational awareness**, favour reputable schools and established programmes, and confirm terms in writing.

Get Qualified & Prepared

WHAT TO KNOW

Earn an **accredited TEFL** for paid work (volunteer roles are flexible); a **degree and licence** open international schools. Prepare your documents, and decide between **paid work and a volunteer placement**. Adaptability and cultural sensitivity go a long way.

HOW TO HELP

Get an **accredited TEFL** for paid work (a degree and licence for international schools), and decide between paid work and a volunteer placement before you go.

GOOD TO KNOW

Adaptability and cultural sensitivity go a long way in Ethiopia's **distinctive, developing market**.

Plan the Hiring Timeline

WHAT TO KNOW

International and private schools recruit **ahead of the school year**; **language centres and volunteer programmes** run more **year-round**. Because much hiring is local or programme-based, reaching out directly helps. Allow time for the work permit.

HOW TO HELP

Plan around the calendar — international and private schools recruit ahead of the year, language centres and volunteer programmes year-round — and reach out directly.

GOOD TO KNOW

Much hiring is **local or programme-based** — reach out to schools and organized programmes directly.

Prepare for the Move

WHAT TO KNOW

You **don't need Amharic to teach** (classes are English-only), but some helps daily life. Almost all roles are in **Addis Ababa**, the high-altitude capital and African Union seat. Ethiopia is affordable and extraordinary — ancient churches, the Simien Mountains, and a unique culture and cuisine.

Prepare practically — teach in English (some Amharic helps daily life); almost all roles are in Addis Ababa, in an affordable, extraordinary country.

WHAT TO KNOW

Once you know your route, **find and compare specific schools, language centres, and programmes in the K12 Academics directory**. A snapshot — program-neutral. Confirm details with Ethiopia's immigration authorities and each employer.

The market

A budget-friendly, culturally extraordinary market — Africa's oldest independent nation, with strong demand for English (proficiency is low) but mostly volunteer and NGO roles alongside some paid work, concentrated in Addis Ababa.

The routes

Private and international schools (the best pay, for licensed teachers), language centres, universities, and many volunteer and NGO programmes (which often offer board rather than a salary); most roles are in Addis Ababa — find and compare in the directory.

Requirements

A TEFL is expected for paid work (volunteer and NGO roles are more flexible, some accepting newly qualified teachers); international schools require a degree, licence, and experience; fluent non-native speakers can find work.

Visa

Paid teaching requires an employer-sponsored work permit, arranged by your school or programme; volunteer programmes typically arrange the appropriate permits; secure a role first.

Pay & move

Modest salaries (many roles volunteer, offering board rather than a salary; international schools pay most); the very low cost of living covers expenses, though substantial saving is unlikely; no Amharic needed to teach (Addis Ababa).
